Decoding text	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Audio formats (e.g., audio book)</li> <li>• Text-to-speech software</li> <li>• Human reader</li> </ul>
Comprehending text	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Advance organizers</li> <li>• Visual cues (e.g., color coding key information)</li> <li>• Digital text that provides definitions</li> <li>• Alternate formats (e.g., diagrams, pictures, hands-on activities)</li> <li>• Previewing vocabulary</li> </ul>
Understanding information presented orally	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Alternate formats (e.g., written text, diagrams)</li> <li>• Repeated information</li> <li>• Advance organizers</li> <li>• Note-takers</li> </ul>
Remembering information	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Visual cues</li> <li>• Graphic organizers</li> <li>• Repeated or paraphrased information</li> </ul>
Identifying key information	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Advance organizers</li> <li>• Visual cues (e.g., color coding key information)</li> <li>• Auditory cues (e.g., "This is important...")</li> <li>• Study guides</li> </ul>
Staying focused	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Visual or auditory signals or prompts</li> <li>• Organized materials</li> <li>• Reduce visual distractions (e.g., clutter)</li> <li>• Reduce auditory distractions (e.g., headphones, quiet time)</li> <li>• Clear and simple directions</li> <li>• Repeated or paraphrased instructions</li> </ul>

Note: This document highlights common examples of presentation accommodations, but it is not an exhaustive list.



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Seeing standard text	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Large print</li><li>• Magnification devices</li><li>• Reduced glare</li><li>• Braille</li><li>• Text-to-speech software</li><li>• Audio formats</li><li>• Human reader</li><li>• Tactile materials</li><li>• Talking devices (e.g., calculators, clocks)</li><li>• Descriptive videos</li></ul>
Hearing information presented orally	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Assistive listening devices</li><li>• Visual cues</li><li>• Advance organizers</li><li>• Augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) devices</li><li>• Sign language</li><li>• Captioning on videos</li><li>• Alternate formats (e.g., visual formats, printed materials)</li><li>• Note-taker</li><li>• Interpreter</li><li>• Smartpen</li></ul>
Holding materials	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Book stand</li><li>• Slanted desk</li><li>• Page holder</li></ul>

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
