IRIS resources are freely available for use in all course-delivery types: face-to-face, online, flipped, or hybrid. This handout offers tips for how to use them in your courses.

IRIS Resource Locator

- Explain the purpose of IRIS to provide educators with evidence-based practices (EBPs) and frameworks for teaching all students, especially struggling learners and those with disabilities.
- Emphasize that resources have been developed and reviewed by experts in the field.
- Show or assign the "Navigating the IRIS Resource Locator" video.
- Note that students can narrow searches in the IRIS Resource Locator by topic area or resource type (e.g., modules, fundamental skills sheets, case studies).
- > Inform students that IRIS materials can be used throughout their careers.

STAR Legacy Modules

Explain the five-component cycle. Show the "Navigating an IRIS STAR Legacy Module" video or work through a module together.



Highlight the estimated completion time and use of the Module Outline to preview content or take notes.



- Demonstrate closed caption and transcript options for videos and audios.
- Show the Challenge video and then activate prior knowledge by discussing the Initial Thoughts questions in whole or small groups.

Case Studies

- Assign STAR Sheets as homework in preparation for completing cases during class.
- Assign partners to find three take-away ideas from the STAR Sheets.
- Complete a Level A case with the whole group; assign Level B or C cases to small groups or as independent work based on

- Have students complete the Revisiting Initial Thoughts questions on the Wrap Up to compare their current thoughts to their initial thoughts.
- Enter the Assessment questions into your course management system. (Reminder: Answers cannot be entered on the IRIS website).
- Have students complete a module of choice to meet a need or answer a question.
- Assign specific module(s) to practicum students or student teachers to address an issue.
- > Use module(s) to train supervisors of field experiences.

- Use case studies or STAR Sheets to solve real-life challenges in field experiences.
- > Share STAR Sheets with mentoring teachers or general educators.
- Share STAR Sheets with students who are struggling in field placements.

Fundamental Skill Sheets, Activities, Interviews, & More

- Select IRIS Activities or Fundamental Skill Sheets to introduce a topic, as an ice breaker, or for independent work.
- > Have students listen to IRIS Interviews to introduce them to nationally recognized experts.
- Use Information Briefs to direct students to information from other trusted sources.

IRIS Online Tools

Encourage students to use the IRIS Glossary to learn education and disability related terms and show them that glossary terms are hyperlinked in modules.

- Assign Fundamental Skill Sheets to show implementation of EBPs.
- View Video Vignettes to show implementation of EBPs and promote awareness of individuals with disabilities and their families.
- Have students use the Film Tool and Children's Book Tool to learn more about media portrayals of disability.
- Demonstrate how to access the IRIS High-Leverage Practices Alignment Tool to identify the four HLP topic areas and find resources that address each of them.

Resources for Faculty: Wraparound Resources, Planning Forms, & More

- > Use Wraparound Resources to extend and deepen the information included in IRIS Modules and Case Studies.
- Use Coursework Planning Forms to strategically integrate IRIS resources into individual courses or the overall curricula.
