

Response Accommodations	
The student has difficulty with:	Examples of Response Accommodations
Verbal communication	<ul> <li>Computer</li> <li>Visuals or gestures</li> <li>Alternate modes of communication (e.g., written, augmentative alternative communication device, sign language)</li> </ul>
Oral expression (e.g., articulation, finding words) or speaking in front of a group	<ul> <li>Alternate response mode (e.g., written report)</li> <li>Increased wait time</li> <li>Visuals</li> </ul>
Spelling	Computer with spell-checking software
Grammar and punctuation	Computer with grammar-checking software
Organizing information	<ul><li>Graphic organizers</li><li>Templates</li></ul>
Mathematics computation	<ul> <li>Calculator</li> <li>Abacus</li> <li>Concrete objects or manipulatives</li> <li>Sheet of basic math facts</li> </ul>
Visual-spatial tasks	<ul> <li>Graph paper to align numbers in mathematics problems</li> <li>Write answers in test booklet (instead of filling in bubbles on answer sheet)</li> </ul>
Handwriting or forming letters	<ul> <li>Scribe</li> <li>Computer</li> <li>Brailler</li> <li>Tape recorder</li> <li>Text-to-speech (or voice-recognition) software</li> <li>Alternate response mode (e.g., oral response)</li> <li>Finger spacer</li> <li>Handwriting guide</li> </ul>
Staying focused	<ul> <li>Write answers in test booklet</li> <li>Graph paper to align numbers in mathematics problems</li> <li>Graphic organizers</li> <li>Monitor understanding of directions</li> </ul>
