Synopsis

After ten years, Mike Kersjes, a special educator, was showing signs of burnout. When he came across an article about NASA's space camp, he was inspired to apply for a spot at the camp for his special education kids. In this book, Kersjes describes the rejection and resistance he and his students experienced along their journey to attend space camp.

Questions/Discussion Topics

- 1. Why did special education teacher Mike Kersjes feel that his students were treated like second-class citizens?
- 2. What happened when the principal, Tom Keller, found out about Mike's call to the Space Center?
- 3. What is Tourette's Syndrome?
- 4. What factors helped the kids succeed at space camp?
- 5. Why do you think there was so much opposition to the kids going to space camp?
- 6. Did the kids win any awards? If so, which ones?
- 7. Discuss your initial perception of the kids in the book. Did your perceptions change as you continued to read? If so, how?
